
2016 District Convention

Are you a #1 with cheese?

When you go to a fast food restaurant, do you always order the same thing? Do you find yourself always eating at the same places? Do you always sit in the same seats at basketball games or at church? We do these things because they are "easy". They don't require us to really think about much of anything. But, we tell ourselves that it is okay and it is not a big deal. We like the routine, the consistency and predictability. We are comfortable and content in the "sameness".

But, are we really missing out and what does this have to do with Lions Club? Do we serve our communities the same way? Do we do the same projects, the same fund-raisers for the same reasons every year. Do we ever try something different? Here are some things to consider:

- 1. **Review every project and activity every year**. Just because you have done it in the past doesn't mean that it needs to happen again. Ask what difference/impact does the project have to the community.
- 2. Follow-up after the project to determine impact/benefit. The project isn't over the day you initially finish it. Follow-up with people involved after the project to get feedback. Have a club meeting with those that ran the project to determine things that went well or needs changed along with review of project impact.
- 3. Reach out to the community to determine other project/services that you should consider. LCI's "Community Needs Assessment" is a good tool. It can be done as a stand alone or as part of a Club Quality Improvement program. Find local community leaders (mayor, town manager, school superintendent, area ministers) and meet with them, face to face, and ask what your club can do to impact the community.
- 4. Never discount/dismiss any project regardless of its size or, more importantly, the size of your club. If there is a demonstrated community need become creative to solve it. Partner with another area club, another service club or school group to get needed manpower. Break the project down into smaller more manageable chunks. Any action you take is better than none. Remarkably, you will gain members if they see your club doing something of impact in the community.

Be more than the same thing you have always been - look for new paths and new opportunities. There are other things on the menu to be discovered.

Nominations and Elections: By now your club's Nominating Committee should have met to propose a slate of officers for the 2017-2018 Lions year. Elections should be held <u>by April 15</u> and your incoming officers reported on the MyLCI website <u>by May 1</u>. Either the club secretary or president can do this. Be sure to click on "Lions Club Officer Report for Next Year" before reporting each officer for next year. All information for your club's president, secretary, treasurer, and membership chairperson should be reported. Your club's vice presidents and directors can also be reported if you choose.

It is <u>important that each officer's information is updated before you file the report.</u> You will probably need your officers' birth years in order to update their information if that information is not already recorded on MyLCI. Please make sure names, addresses, phone numbers, spouses' names and e-mail addresses are correct. It is <u>very important that e-mail addresses for all officers are included</u> and <u>correct</u>. Most communication is now done by e-mail and your officers will not receive those communications if their e-mail addresses are not known or are incorrect.

As you report each officer for next year, be sure to click "save" before starting to report the next officer. Before you log out, click on "Club Information" and check to make sure the correct days of the month and meeting times are recorded along with the place and address of your meeting place.

Once you have finished, click on "Reports" and then "Lions Club Officer Report for Next Year." Save the report to your computer and then e-mail it as an attachment to DG Peg Van Nevel at pitchinpeg@yahoo.com (as she is responsible for seeing that all clubs report their officers) and DGE Tom Polk at tomkimpolk@embarqmail.com so that he can get a head start on his directory. The report will not include spouses' names, so when you e-mail the report to them, please include in your cover note the names of the spouses of each of the officers and if they are Lions.

THE FOUR LEVELS OF SERVICE IN LIONISM

Everyone who joins Lionism eventually finds those activities which they most enjoy doing. They also decide what level of leadership in those activities they wish to provide.

Obviously, the most desirable thing that should happen is that each person who enters Lionism would eventually rise to the highest level of service and leadership of which they are capable and comfortable in their clubs. This is necessary if an organization is going to grow in service.

At the same time it is necessary to constantly be seeking new members to work in our clubs and to help maintain present activities. They may become our future leaders if they enjoy being a Lion and bring new ideas and new energy to our clubs.

Listed below are the four levels of service in Lionism along with examples of each type. As Lion Ann always says, "This is according to Charlie." As you read on you may be able to better understand what your future participation in Lionism will be.

LEVEL ONE—HELPING PEOPLE ENJOY LIFE

These are simple activities. They may bring joy into the lives of children or the elderly. Or they may be activities which people would have difficulty doing for themselves or are community service activities. Examples: Children's Christmas Party, Easter Egg Hunt, park or roadside cleanup, bingo night at a nursing home, etc. This type of activity brings a little joy into people's lives and to the participating Lion.

LEVEL TWO—TEMPORARY SURVIVAL ACTIVITIES

These are activities which help people over the rough spots in life: food baskets for the unemployed, transportation to the doctor, clothing for needy children, ringing the bells for the Salvation Army, temporary family emergency assistance, eyeglasses assistance, etc.

LEVEL THREE—POSSIBLE LIFE CHANGING ACTIVITIES

These affect the people helped and the participating Lions themselves: eyeglass collection and the mission trips, children's eye screening, Leo Clubs, supporting Lions Eye Bank, Blind School and Speech and Hearing Programs and the District Dictionary Project.

LEVEL FOUR—LEADERSHIP AND LEADERSHIP TRAINING

Effective fundraising, chairing a club project, serving as a club and/or district officer, and bringing in new members are vital parts of keeping Lionism strong.

When we think of PDG Nick Xinopoulos certain "Key Words" come to mind.

INITIATIVE; COMPASSION; COMMUNICATION; LEADERSHIP: PATRIOTISM AND INTEGRITY.

INITIATIVE: Most of you have known PDG Nick for quite some time now. We know that he grew up in a small village in Greece and was on the receiving end of government assistance. He knew that there was no way that he could better himself in his poor village and decided to immigrate to the United States of America. Once here he knew he had to learn to communicate with others so he attended night school. Many late nights he found himself walking 7 miles to get home after staying after class if he didn't understand the evening lesson. It didn't take him long to work his way from a clothing store tailor to store manager. After 10 years in the clothing business he started working at General Motors and worked his way from a sewing machine repairman retiring 30 years later as the most successful manufacturing manager at Rolls Royce, Inc.

COMPASSION: PDG Nick joined the Brownsburg Lions Club in 1990. He has served his club in all leadership roles and is an active member of the Board. Nick and his Partner-in-Service Lion Gretchen (who has been



a club secretary for 8 years and Cabinet Secretary for 5 years) are the club Vision Screening Coordinators for both School age children and the Operation KidSight program. PDG Nick has just returned from his 4th Eyeglass Mission in Mexico and he has visited a hospital in Delhi, India on behalf of the Indiana Lions Eye Bank to follow-up on corneal transplant procedures. Both PDG Nick and Lion Gretchen have COMPASSION for better vision for others. LEADERSHIP: Not only has Nick served at the club level but he was the 25C District Governor for the year 2009-2010. He has also been on the Board of Directors for the Indiana Lions Eye Bank, Inc. since 2003 and is now serving his second year as Chairman of the Board. During his first year as Chairman of the Board he initiated the move of the Operation KidSight program from the Eye Bank to the Indiana Lions State Office. Not only did this generate \$600.00 each month to the Indiana Lions Foundation but it also made the KidSight office more accessible to ALL Lions of Indiana.

PDG Nick has been a member of the Indiana Lions International Convention Committee (3-year term) and has also served on the Indiana Lions International Understanding Committee. He also supports the Indiana Lions Foundation by working shifts at the Indiana State Fair and many years he has been known to work extra shifts as they are needed.

COMMUNICATION: He has been personally invited by 4 International Presidents to work on the International Convention Credentials Committee where he has been able to use his multi-lingual skills to help make the registration of club delegates a smoother process. (We note here that while PDG Nick is working, Lion Gretchen attends the Plenary Sessions with the Indiana Lions.) PDG Nick believes that any question asked gets an answer in a timely manner. Many of you can attest to this.

INTEGRITY: PDG Nick is an outstanding and well-respected member of the community who works hard to make sure the Brownsburg Lions Club and Lions Clubs International are well respected.

COMMITMENT: PDG Nick has been known to gather "Keys for Cancer" from the community hardware stores even though he is not a trustee for the Cancer Control project. He also supports the ISBVI by riding a tricycle in the annual "Brian's Trike Race." If he hears of a club that needs volunteers and he is available, he will be there to help. If you haven't seen his brochure, please read through it to see his accomplishments.

As a matter of fact, we are one of only four districts in Indiana (including A, C and F) that participate in missions, in addition to collecting glasses. District A & F work together in these endeavors.

The important link in this chain of events is the collection of eyeglasses. We need every club in the district to collect and forward the used glasses to help this process provide glasses for eventual distribution to individuals who cannot afford them without our assistance.

Your club's used eyeglasses will be sorted, washed, the prescriptions read, and then re-sorted and filed for shipment to the Mexican city that will host our mission. We work with local Lions in Mexico, making our efforts an international project! If you are not yet collecting eyeglasses, we can help you start this easy project. If you are not forwarding your glasses for use by the district's eyeglass project, give us a call so we can give you more information. District 25-G LCIF contributions at 78% of goal

In the latest report from LCIF, clubs and individuals in District 25-G have contributed \$17,627 of the district's \$22,500 goal. Contributions from 26 of the district's 53 clubs have been reported. When sending in contributions, use the Melvin Jones Fellowship form available on the district's website (www.lions25g.org and then select the **Documents** menu item, then the **LCIF Forms** submenu item). If you are not sending in the full \$1000 for a Melvin Jones Fellowship, circle 'To Be Named Later' under item 3, Recipient of Recognition, and leave section 4 blank. The amount sent will be left on deposit in the club's account (or individual donor, if the gift is coming from an individual Lion) and can be applied for a Melvin Jones Fellowship later. For donations of \$20, \$50 or \$100, the donor may request a Contributing Member pin, and the check box in section 2 should accordingly be marked.

Tell the staff at the ticket window that you are with the Lions so you can receive the special Lions commemorative ticket stub.
